ENIGMATIC HEAD OF A FAMOUS PHARAOH

18th Dynasty, c. 1325 B.C.

On exhibit in the Rosicrucian Egyptian Museum is a charming fragment from the head of a life-size statue of a New Kingdom Egyptian pharaoh. This sculpture was purchased from New York's Brooklyn Museum in 1938. The red quartzite left-half of this head wears a striped royal wigcover (the Nemes headdress) and is adorned with a prominent cobra-uraeus which loops at its brow.

This artifact exhibits highly refined workmanship, and the general nature of the modeling of its features date the headdress to about the time of the Amarna Period (1450-1350 B.C.), sometime between the reigns of Kings Amenhotep III and Ramses II.

There is a marked softness in the shape and surface of the sculpture's cheeks and around the eye and nose. The eye in particular is finely modeled without the usual heavy eyelines and outlined eyebrow. The surviving left ear is very carefully formed and shows every internal detail. The slightly enlarged lobe with large piercing again reiterates the Amarna Period dating.

Reconsidering all the interesting features together—the form of the uraeus, the modeling of the eye and ear, and the general characteristics of the face— most probably this is a fragment of a fine statue of the "Boy King" Tutankhamon. The sculpture may well have been one of a series made for the king's mortuary temple near Medinet Habu in Western Thebes. Similar pieces are exhibited in the Boston Museum of Fine Arts and the Cairo Museum.

Most of King Tutankhamon's images have been usurped and reused by his successors, Kings Ay and Horemheb, reminding us of his fate and the difficult times of his short but notable reign.



RMT:

It has often been said that the Rosicrucian Order has a grand plan for the betterment and increased freedom of humanity. Can you talk about this? What are your ideas on this subject?

CB:

It is my sincere belief that we can only be truly happy if we are in possession of knowledge, for it is knowledge alone that is able to free us from ignorance. This ignorance is at the root of all the evils in the world, for it gives great strength to pride, hatred, jealousy, selfishness, fanaticism and, in more general terms, all weaknesses which turn people against each other. For many centuries, AMORC has been perpetuating teachings which, quite independently of their cultural and spiritual content, target the development of each individual's moral qualities such as generosity, altruism, humility, tolerance, and so on. In so doing, our aim is to improve individuals and thus humanity, turning the Rosicrucian Order into a true worldwide fraternity, fired by the highest of ideals.



RMT:

How is our organization different in its approach in comparison with similar types of metaphysical organizations or schools for the upliftment of humanity?

CB:

As far as I am aware, AMORC is one of the oldest philosophical organizations. Its traditional origins are to be found in the mystery schools of antiquity and notably those in Ancient Egypt. This means that the teachings being perpetuated today are extremely old and are not the work of one individual, as is the case for the majority of pseudo-mystical movements currently in existence. Rosicrucian philosophy is the result of knowledge passed down through the ages by initiates.

We need to specify the seven characteristics of AMORC, characteristics that few organizations, if any, share. They are as follows: AMORC is a worldwide organization. It is not a religion? It is totally apolitical. It is open to men and women alike. In AMORC there is no racial segregation; there is no social discrimination. AMORC has a true ontology, that is to say, as I mentioned earlier, its teachings are made up of knowledge that the great mystics of the past taught concerning the mysteries of the universe, nature, and humanity. I really do believe AMORC to be the most complete school of thought in the Western World.

RMT:

Rosicrucian philosophy seems especially necessary in our contemporary society with all its problems, challenges, and opportunities for growth—or has it always been that way? What role can the Rosicrucian Order play in addressing important issues of vital concern to our society?

CB:

It is all too evident that humanity is up against an unprecedented crisis and is experiencing enormous difficulties when it comes to resolving the problems arising at the close of this millennium. This is because humanity is the victim of the excessive materialism that has been developing during the past century. Instead of making us happier, such materialism has in fact made us slaves to technology and to the effects

technology has on us and our environment. I believe that the only way to remedy the situation is to bring an end to this materialism and to give a spiritual direction to the future of the world.

In its role as a traditional, philosophical, and initiatory organization, AMORC perpetuates a series of teachings whose aim is to place spirituality at the center of human activity and provide each individual with the possibility of bringing that person's life in line with his or her aspirations.

RMT:


Can Rosicrucianism—its philosophy and teachings—help humanity at this point in civilization?

CB:

Since the beginnings of the Order, that is to say in antiquity, the Order has always made

contributions to the arts, sciences, and to civilization in general. Humanity is currently at a crucial point in its history and evolution, for now more than ever, we have the means either to self destruct or alternatively to transform the earth into a veritable paradise. All depends on the way in which we apply our free will, both on an individual and collective basis, over the coming years. At the risk of repeating myself, I would like to say that it is absolutely essential that we make spirituality the basis of our choices, be it in the areas of politics, economics, science, education, or other fields. In order to help in this endeavor, AMORC makes a series of teachings available which are based on knowledge of the laws of nature, the universe, and spiritual mat-



ters. It seems obvious to me that within these laws is to be found the happiness to which all humans aspire from deep within their souls.

RMT:

Society today seems to be out of touch with nature and natural rhythms. Could you comment on that and the Rosicrucian role in changing this destructive aspect of our society?

CB:

It is indeed true that through ignorance, through negligence, or through financial interests, humanity is inflicting all sorts of evils upon our planet—such as pollution, excessive destruction of forests, massacre of animals, to name just a few. And vet, our planet deserves to be treated with utmost respect and should be the object of our admiration, for not only is it where we live, but also because our planet is the chef d'oeuvre of all creation. It seems obvious to me that if nothing is done on a worldwide scale to stop these evils, our earth will suffer a long and drawn out death in which we will each have played a part.

Ecology is an integral part of mysticism, for we cannot take an interest in the mysteries of life without being concerned with the future of our planet. This explains why Rosicrucians are particularly sensitive to the problems of the environment and try to set an example in respect to nature and all living beings. We must never forget that the earth is the mother of all and our survival depends upon her.

RMT:

Our current society is fascinated with the marvels of computer technology and technologists assure us that technology in the form of computers will benefit—even save—our civilization. And yet, as the information superhighway expands, children's reading levels continue to drop, poverty increases, and forests are dying. Can technology provide the answers to our present dilemma?

CB:

No one can deny that science has made great contributions to the well-being of humanity. However, having said this, science has also had some not-so-great effects. Machines that were designed to help us have succeeded in RMT: replacing us, thus explaining why so many people are without work. Indeed technological progress has moved forward at a much greater rate than the development of consciousness. And, as is often said, science without consciousness is but

the ruin of the soul. This gap has given modern society an overly materialistic nature, thus reinforcing selfishness and increasing poverty.

It would appear to me that it is of utmost urgency that human beings must be placed at the center of our thoughts, because if we continue on this materialistic path, we are heading towards a world of computers and machines in which human beings will no longer have a place.

As far as the Internet is concerned, I believe it to be an extraordinary means of communication and information, but it could also be very dangerous. I believe that here too, we must be very careful in ensuring that it is used only for good and knowledge, and not for evil, ignorance. and perversion. Unfortunately, however, no one can deny that it is currently used in ways that are not always noble.

Will the Rosicrucian teachings—the monographs—eventually be offered online (in a digitized form) to our members?

CB:

There is a link between this question and the last. I would like it to be known that AMORC has absolutely nothing against technology. Indeed, we make use of it to carry out our activities. However, having said this, there are no plans whatsoever to make the teachings available using information technology (on disks, CD-ROM, the Internet, etc.), for this would go against our teachings' traditional origins and their initiatory aims.

Nowadays, the teachings take the form of monographs which are sent out each month to the members of the Order. These monographs are made up of small booklets of five to ten pages each. This does not seem excessive to me and I am convinced that it is more noble, dignified, and natural to gain knowledge through studying the contents of a booklet rather than via a computer screen. In my opinion, nothing can replace the emotional, cultural, and spiritual impressions experienced when you hold a monograph in your hands and discover page-by-page, paragraph-byparagraph, line-by-line, and word-by-word, the knowledge contained therein.

We live in an age when everything is much faster and increasingly speeded up-including the availability of information. The Rosicrucian Order has always presented its teachings to the student over a period of time and through a series

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of degrees. What do you say to those who want to speed through the degrees, who want all the information now and want to absorb the teachings at a much faster rate?

CB:

It is true that we live in a time when the pace of life is ever increasing and everyone strives to do the greatest number of things in the shortest time possible. And this helps to explain why people are not only suffering from increasingly high stress levels, but are also more impatient. The Rosicrucian teachings are given gradually to AMORC members and a number of years are necessary in order to study the basic concepts. This is all part of the Order's initiatory technique. It is simply not possible to learn all about divine laws in a few months, for gaining such knowledge involves not only an intellectual process but also a spiritual process. In other words, this knowledge passes through to the very soul of the person and this takes time. It is not possible to carry out a philosophical quest if we place time restrictions on ourselves-indeed, a whole lifetime is not sufficient for people to learn all there is to know about themselves, nature, the universe, and God. Therefore, the first virtue that any mystic must learn is patience, for [on the mystic path] there is no speeded-up way, no shortcuts to be taken. Time is a human concept and if we remain enslaved to time we will never be able to release ourselves from our material restraints in order to rise toward the spiritual world.

RMT:

In the past, great civilizations have risen, flourished, and then just as quickly fallen into decay. In your opinion, will our civilization suffer such a fate or will we be able to avoid the pitfalls and mistakes of earlier civilizations?

CB:

It is true that the majority of the great civilizations of the past degenerated once they had achieved a very high level of development. There are two major explanations for this. First, we must realize that this is all part of a natural process, in the same way as every living creature is born, develops until maturity, and then dies. Secondly, such a process was probably necessary for humanity to develop to its current state. Every civilization inherits the cultural, technological, and spiritual heritage of those who went before.

Having said this, however, I believe that the world as we know it is made up of one, allencompassing civilization, because all people and nations are joined by a common destiny. Thus, it is up to humanity as a whole to make the right decisions so that our destructive instincts do not cause civilization to disappear. It is true that humanity is going through a crisis period and civilization appears at times to be in decay. But I believe we should remain optimistic, for humanity has the potential to save itself and to look forward to a great future.


RMT:

The revised Rosicrucian monographs—from the Neophyte through to the 7th Degree—vary somewhat from the old monographs issued by Dr. H. Spencer Lewis and Ralph M. Lewis. The material covered is about the same, but the approach is slightly different. Will this be true also of the higher degrees, or do you anticipate new information being inserted into the monographs?

CB:

At the beginning of the 20th century, Harvey Spencer Lewis, first Imperator of the Order in its present cycle of activity, began to put the teachings in writing using the archives made available to him by the Rose-Croix of Europe and adding to this his own personal knowledge. Frater Ralph Lewis continued this task. Of course, they were both aided in this by Rosicrucians who were chosen specifically for their individual abilities in particular areas. But time moves on and it was felt necessary to revise the monographs in order that they be perfectly adapted to the development of consciousness and that they take into account the more recent scientific discoveries. Keeping up to date was always a great worry for H. Spencer Lewis and Ralph Lewis, as indeed it is for me. It is for this reason what when I was appointed Imperator in 1990, I decided to set in motion the systematic revision of the Rosicrucian teachings. I was helped in this task by appropriate members. Generally speaking, this revision consisted of the following:

- 1) Restructuring the different study themes by degree. For example, the 1st Temple Degree now deals only with laws of matter; the 2nd Temple Degree, with laws of consciousness; the 3rd Temple Degree, with laws of life, etc.
- 2) Developing certain subjects in a way that is only applicable to the Rosicrucian tradition (vowel sounds, psychic centers, etc.).



3) Adding, from the 10th Degree onwards, a number of subjects not previously dealt with in the Rosicrucian teachings, but which deserve to be included because of their obvious interest to members, such as esotericism of the great religions, great mystic traditions of the past, and so on

To date, we have revised the teachings up to the 11th Degree, and the work continues. The sole aim of this task is to adapt the spiritual and cultural heritage of the Rose-Croix to our times, but in such a way that we maintain all its purity and authenticity. This is indeed the same task undertaken by Harvey Spencer Lewis at the beginning of this century.

RMT:

As was true of his father before him, former Imperator Ralph M. Lewis was a prolific writer of books, magazine articles, and monographs. His articles appeared in every issue of the *Rosicrucian Digest* and *Rosicrucian Forum*. You have not yet been able to be as prolific a writer as Ralph Lewis. Perhaps other concerns have occupied your time? How is your experience of your role as Imperator different from that of H. Spencer Lewis and Ralph M. Lewis? Can you elaborate on this, please?

CB:

First of all, I would like to point out that Ralph M. Lewis, who, by the way, I knew very well, and to whom I still feel very close, held the position of Imperator of AMORC from 1939 until 1987-for a total of 48 years. I was appointed Imperator in 1990 and, as our members no doubt remember, this was during turbulent times for our Order. At the same time that I was coping with those difficulties and all that my new role entailed, I was still the Grand Master of the French jurisdiction—which incidentally is one of the largest Grand Lodges in the world and demands an enormous amount of work. This work mainly took the form of keeping abreast with correspondence coming from thousands of members, supervising the activities of approximately 400 affiliated bodies, and writing my monthly messages and other speeches for Rosicrucian Conventions and Martinist Conventicles. There were, of course, other supervisory tasks: managing the Junior Order of Torchbearers and Friends of AMORC, publishing the Rosicrucian Forum, supervising the very active Rose-Croix International University and our Cultural Centers, and so on. All this occurred over three years while I was also working, as mentioned earlier, on the revision of the monographs. Also, the administrative and ritual folios were being revised for Lodges, Chapters, and Pronaoi. (To keep you abreast, this revision is now virtually complete.) This all took a great deal of time.

However, on the subject of writing, which is the topic of your question, I published a book entitled So Mote It Be! in 1994. In conclusion, I would like to add that I travel throughout the world, working on restructuring our Order and furthering the Order's development in countries where we were formerly not present. I maintain very close contact with all the Grand Lodges and visit them on a regular basis. For example, I come to the United States several times a year for Conventions or for meetings in San Jose.

I would say that that sounds like quite a good amount of work for only six years! And so, God willing, let's meet again in 25 or 30 years to again review the situation.

RMT:

In the past few years the Rosicrucian Order has expanded into countries where Rosicrucian activity and membership were forbidden just a few short years ago, including the former Soviet Union. Can you speak about the latest developments in this area and what other nations might be included in future expansion plans for the Order? China? Egypt?

CB:

I have already had the opportunity to talk about this subject in the letter I recently sent to Rosicrucians throughout the world. The great difficulty in the Eastern European countries is due to these nations' economies. The economic situation makes it difficult for us to get involved in these countries where the major concerns of the inhabitants are above all material survival—and, of course, this is completely understandable, given their particular circumstances.

Nevertheless, we have found that in some countries, through gestures of good will, we have been allowed to set up administrative centers and future Grand Lodges. I can now tell you that our Order has just been officially recognized in Russia, and we are hopeful that we shall be able to develop very quickly there. As you can do doubt imagine, this is an enormous task, especially in terms of translation [of the teachings into the Russian language]. The work is underway, but it is a slow process. A number of different jurisdictions have shared the task

Rosicrucian Digest No.4 1996 between them and are supervising one or several countries. This explains how responsibility for China has been given to Peter Bindon, Grand Master for English-speaking members throughout Australia, Asia, and New Zealand. It is no easy task, but I believe there are possibilities for Rosicrucian development in this huge country.

As for Egypt and all Middle Eastern countries, there are members in those countries, but they belong to jurisdictions outside of the Middle East. Establishing Rosicrucianism in the Arab world appears to us to be very difficult, if not impossible, given the current climate and due to the nature and attitudes of the people in these countries. The vast majority are reticent when faced with our Western traditions. Of course, there are great spiritualists to be found there, but unfortunately their voices are unheard due to religious fanaticism. Such fanaticism is becoming ever more present, and thus there is less opportunity for an Order such as ours to carry out its activities. I am sure some of you will say that Egypt is at the very heart of the Rosicrucian tradition. Of course, this is so. But then again, people in those countries could turn to you and say that there is no comparison between the great epoch of the Pharaohs and Egyptian society today. And it is the same, unfortunately, in many other countries in that part of the world.

RMT:

As we rapidly approach the millennium, can you please speak about the future of the Order—your vision of the Order—in the 21st century?

CB:

As I have already said, it is absolutely essential that humanity must give a spiritual direction to its future, for it is on this absolute condition that the calm pursuit of future development depends. If this is not the case, the problems faced by humanity at present will only become worse and place humanity in great danger. This is why AMORC will do all it can to further its teachings throughout the world over the coming years. I truly believe that Rosicrucian philosophy is a particularly inspiring mystical pathway that contributes immensely to raising the collective consciousness of the world. On the eve of the 21st century and the third millennium—which incidentally coincides with the entry into the Aquarian Agethe Rosicrucian tradition has a fundamental role

to play in the awakening of humanity to authentic spirituality and to make us true agents of universal peace.

RMT:


I understand that as a youth you spent at least one summer with Imperator Ralph M. Lewis and Soror Lewis in their home here in San Jose—and I understand that you became quite close to Frater Lewis. Could you talk about your friendship with Frater and Soror Lewis and what it was like to spend a boyhood summer as a guest in their home?

CB:

As any teenager would be, I was delighted to make this journey and to discover America. It was during this period that I became comfortable with the English language and this has, of course, been a major advantage to me, because had I not been able to speak English, it would have been difficult for me to carry out my current tasks properly.

I felt very shy while staying with Frater and Soror Lewis because to me they were such exceptional beings. Frater Lewis in particular had a very strong influence on me, through his physical presence, his seriousness, and his tone of voice, which was sometimes very firm. I became very fond of him straightaway, as I did of Soror Gladys, who took great care of me. They let me feel very free to do as I pleased and this is how I was able to discover all the buildings in Rosicrucian Park and find out about the activities of all the departments there. I found it all absolutely fascinating, and it is for this reason that I went on to spend other periods of time both with Frater Lewis and at Rosicrucian Park.

One very moving memory I have of our Imperator and his wife is when they came to Paris for the Rosicrucian World Convention in 1977. This was indeed the last time that Soror Gladys attended such an event. Frater Ralph Lewis' last visit to the Château d'Omonville, headquarters of the French jurisdiction, dates back to 1983. I will never forget the moment he left to go home—it was highly emotional. No doubt, he knew that it was the last time he would visit this country and this Rosicrucian site. Ten years have passed since his transition, but his presence is still as real for me and his memory remains engraved in my thoughts and in my heart.



A Brief Biography of Ralph M. Lewis



January 12, 1997, marks the tenth anniversary of the transition of former Imperator Ralph M. Lewis. Frater Lewis held the office of Imperator for forty-eight years, from 1939 to 1987. This article is taken from the speech delivered by Frater Lee at Ralph M. Lewis' Memorial Service in the AMORC Supreme Temple, January 22, 1987.

Rosicrucian Digest No.4 1996 RALPH MAXWELL LEWIS was born on Sunday, February 14, 1904, at 1:30 a.m., in New York City. As a youngster he received his basic education in the schools of Manhattan and at a military academy in New Jersey. By the time

Ralph Lewis was fourteen years of age, his father, the renowned Dr. H. Spencer Lewis, had already established in New York City the beginnings of the Second Cycle of public activity for the Rosicrucian Order, AMORC, in America.

The Lewis family moved to San Francisco, California, in 1918 so as to extend the Order's work to the western United States. The following year Ralph joined them and continued his education in San Francisco, studying law and accountancy.

However, being naturally drawn to the investigation of the mysteries of life, the young man's inner, searching nature caused him a certain restlessness, and more abstract studies soon commanded his attention. He became engrossed in the studies of archeology, geology, and oceanography. These subjects eventually led him into the field of metaphysics and finally mysticism.

A RESPONSIVE CHORD

The Rosicrucian Order struck a responsive chord within Ralph Lewis and, although still a relatively young man, his father obtained special permission for his son Ralph to cross the threshold of AMORC membership in San Francisco. Ralph Lewis progressed through the Rosicrucian teachings, and in 1924 was elected to the important post of AMORC Supreme Secretary. This position afforded him an outlet for his unique combination of talents—his creativity and organizational genius.

Ralph Lewis advocated and was able to bring about a beneficial centralization of the Rosicrucian Order's activities, and a great expansion of the Order's Home Sanctum membership. The overall effect was to substantially strengthen AMORC in a material and, ultimately, spiritual manner. He continued and enlarged upon the Great Work of his father, H. Spencer Lewis, a man whom he deeply loved and respected.

After spending a short time in Tampa, Florida, where the AMORC Supreme Grand Lodge was temporarily located, Ralph Lewis moved to San Jose, California, with his father and others, and established the seeds of what was to become a magnificent landmark in the "Valley of Heart's Delight"—Rosicrucian Park, with its impressive buildings and grounds. Today Rosicrucian Park with its fine Egyptian Museum is one of San Jose's most prominent tourist attractions.

Meanwhile, Ralph Lewis continued to travel on behalf of the Order, clarifying and countering many peoples' erroneous notions concerning mysticism, and in particular, the Rosicrucians. On various occasions he was a delegate to the F.U.D.O.S.I., the federation of authentic arcane initiatory orders of the world, in Europe. He was initiated into the Ordre Martiniste et Synarchique. Because of his impressive philosophic writings and his interest in science he received, in 1939, the Star and Cross of Science from the International Academic Council of Washington, D.C. The French government later honored Ralph Lewis with the National Order of Merit for his service to humanity, and the French Academy awarded him the *Prix Thorlet* in arts, sciences, and letters.


On August 2, 1939, Dr. H. Spencer Lewis passed through transition. Following in the footsteps of his father, Ralph Lewis was elected Imperator on August 12, 1939, and in March, 1940, was elected President of the International Supreme Council of the Order Rosae Crucis. At that time he was also appointed Director of the Rosicrucian Egyptian Museum and Planetarium.

ENLIGHTENED LEADERSHIP

Ralph M. Lewis held the office of Imperator for forty-eight years. During that time, under his leadership, the Rosicrucian Order grew into a recognized worldwide force for goodness and the unfoldment of the higher consciousness of the individual.

Throughout the years Ralph Lewis organized and conducted numerous motion picture and camera expeditions to sites of ancient civilizations, and on several occasions traveled throughout the world filming ancient cultures on the far-flung continents of the globe. He lectured and greeted our beloved members in nearly every land in which AMORC is established. In fact, he was instrumental in bringing into existence several of the Grand Lodges, and supported and promoted the spread of the Rosicrucian teachings in fourteen languages.

Ralph M. Lewis was keenly interested in almost every aspect of the unfoldment of humanity's higher faculties. In his own life, besides being Imperator, he was personally involved in a wide variety of avocations. Besides interests in Egyptology, radio broadcasting, and the support of the arts and sciences, he was an animal lover, gave numerous audio and visual tape presentations, wrote several mystical



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dramas and allegories, personally supervised the Order's advertising efforts and created its many displays, wrote any number of books which are to be found in public libraries around the world, and designed most of the promotional leaflets we all use so often. He wrote an untold number of *Rosicrucian Forum* and *Rosicrucian Digest* articles, not to mention revising and bringing into actuality new monographs which we all study and benefit from.

Ralph Lewis was a devoted husband to his beloved wife Gladys for 55 years. Several years following Gladys' transition he remarried. For his remaining years Ralph Lewis was devoted to his beloved wife Margaret.

He was also a fearsome foe to any and all who attacked the good name of the Rosicrucian Order, AMORC.

Through it all he continued, sometimes even in ill health, to walk to work every weekday morning to conduct the business of the Rosicrucian Order. He was a familiar and highly respected figure on the job and in the neighborhood and community. He always seemed to have time to stop and chat with the employees and visitors to Rosicrucian Park. He had a wonderful sense of humor and great kindliness, which endeared him to so many people.

That wonderful personal touch was perhaps most manifest in the thousands of individual letters he directed to our members around the world, encouraging them, advising them, giving them hope and guidance in a practical and loving way. Each birthday card contained an uplifting message from Frater Lewis. The 1987 card seems to crystallize his highest hopes for us all, and was to be his last salutation—a final good-bye to the Fraters and Sorores he loved so much:

Each day we intentionally, or indifferently, sow a seed. These seeds are our daily thoughts and actions. Nature nurtures them alike. Time will reveal their harvest. Will it be what we have sought from life?

Therefore, it is my wish that during the forthcoming year, each day for you will be a planting of a seed of thought and action that will provide you the Golden Harvest of health, happiness, and Peace Profound.

Ralph Maxwell Lewis experienced the Great Initiation on Monday, January 12, 1987, at 11:26 p.m. He was eighty-two years old.





They pray for the troubled mind of a national leader without including the desire for Divine Guidance for the leaders of all nations throughout the world.





THE EVOLUTION AND BEAUTIFICATION OF ROSICRUCIAN PARK

OTHER NATURE has a powerful ally called Father Time. Two thousand years ago, about the time Jesus the Christ walked the earth, nature and time were present at the planting of thousands of evergreens called Sequoia sempervirens (redwood trees), along the coast of Northern California. Over the years these soft, reddish-barked trees have thrived and grown, some to an awesome and majestic height of over 300 feet. And all with relatively little assistance or management from us!


When we humans, on the other hand, decide to construct material edifices in which to live and work, nature and time take a different approach. Almost immediately deterioration sets in and we humans are forced to maintain, upkeep, clean, repair, and often, eventually, replace those

edifices. Take Rosicrucian Park, for example.

Situated in California's lovely Santa Clara Valley since 1927, Rosicrucian Park, the headquarters of the English Grand Lodge for North America, has undergone a series of facelifts and beautification projects over the years. The old Administration Building, erected in 1928, was restyled and modernized until its demise 40 years later, making way for a new and more impressive Administration Building. During its existence on the earth plane, the old building was also home to the first Supreme Temple, and an Art Gallery, one of the few in the city of San Jose at the time.

Following the theme of construction in the Egyptian style, in honor of the original ancient Mystery School tradition, a

new Supreme Temple was erected in 1949, designed to function solely as a place of fraternal study and sacred ritual.

An exquisite shrine was conceived, built and dedicated to a special Rosicrucian initiation that took place in Egypt in 1929. So in 1931, there appeared on the landscape of Rosicrucian Park a lovely place for contemplation and meditation, called the Amenhotep Shrine. Alas, however, in 1965 it had to be demolished due to the inexorable alliance of time and nature's forces. But a beautiful new shrine was then erected over the old, and is now called the Akhnaton Shrine.

During the course of the past seven decades, it should be noted that a number of private homes were located within the square block now known as Rosicrucian Park. As the inevitable happened, and owners passed away, if the homes could not be moved they were razed and landscaped in a marvelously attractive manner, with lush trees, bushes, colorful flowers and meandering walkways, that to this day attracts thousands of visitors.


In 1931, the Francis Bacon Auditorium was erected and has been the venue for countless public lectures, theatrical productions, meetings and seminars. It also


housed the Alexandria Bookstore and coffee shop. The Auditorium too has seen its share of the winds of change, and is still in the process of evolution.

The Rosicrucian Egyptian Museum was first built in 1932 and lasted a little over 30 years before being leveled, because the huge collection of artifacts was fairly bursting at the seams in the old building. The old museum was removed and the present museum, again in authentic Egyptian style, was constructed and opened in 1966. The imposing new museum then became the home of the Art Gallery as well.

The year 1934 witnessed the appearance of the Rose-Croix University building, where students regularly congregated for classes each summer, and the Rosicrucian Research Library was added five years later. Before the Library was built, in 1936, the Rosicrucian Planetarium was erected, to the delight of countless school groups and interested visitors.

However, even before the birth of the Rose-Croix University building, the Rosicrucian Research Library, or the Planetarium, an Administration Annex Building was erected in 1928, which housed many departments over the years, such as Shipping/Receiving, Financial, Latin American division, Registration, Council

of Solace, and others. This building now faces the rigors of the passing of its era of faithful service.

Even Dr. H. Spencer Lewis, who founded Rosicrucian Park in 1927, did not expect the headquarters to remain static for all time. In an article written for the Rosicrucian Forum in 1934, entitled "The Future of the Order," he stated: "Of course, we cannot tell how long the present buildings will stand on their present foundations. None of them were built of such material as to last for ages, because this would be too costly, and we are not convinced that the present location of the main buildings will be the most desirable in the years to come. Right now we are in a very exclusive and more or less secluded residential section of this beautiful valley but in another fifty years we may be surrounded by tall buildings, business buildings, and congested conditions that would warrant us in moving our location to some other area of this state or perhaps another area of the country.... As the buildings weaken and become to old for use, new ones will be built or they will be remedied or altered, and perhaps, as I have said, moved to other locations."

Although Mother Nature and Father Time will carry on in their own implacable ways, Rosicrucian Park continues to evolve through the dedicated efforts of those committed to the high ideals of AMORC. Its impressive buildings, the beauty and fragrance of its hundreds of roses, the marvelous variety of its vegetation, and its unique aura of peace and tranquility, is like a sanctuary, a haven for contemplation upon life's unending vicissitudes.

On July 27, 1996, Imperator Christian Bernard installed Frater Peter Bindon as Grand Master for the new Australasian Grand Lodge. 



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
